The Downtown Development District of New Orleans (DDD) was created by the Louisiana Legislature in 1974 as the nation's first assessment-based business improvement district (BID) to provide enhanced services in economic development, cleaning, and safety. The DDD services the area bounded by Iberville Street, the Pontchartrain Expressway, Claiborne Avenue, and the Mississippi River. The DDD is governed by an 11-member Board of Commissioners who represent a cross-section of the diverse Downtown community. Appointed by local elected officials, our Commissioners help guide the policies and programs of the DDD.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS ON YELP

Create your Yelp page by visting www.yelp.com and navigating to "Yelp for Business." Click either "Add a Business" or "Claim your Business" to begin.

ADD DETAILED INFO

Under the "Info" section, add your business' information keeping in mind that the more detailed your info is, the better! Revisit this section at least every six months to make necessary changes and ensure your information is up to date.

PROVIDE VISUALS

A picture speaks a thousand words, and quality images can help set your business apart. Take photos of everything: inside, outside, menu, seating, products, events, etc., and consider hiring a professional.

LINK TO YOUR PAGE

Post links or buttons to your Yelp on Instagram, Facebpok, website, X, etc. You can even print QR codes to your Yelp page and hang them in-store while remembering that Yelp does not accept review solicitation. Instead of asking your customers for reviews, plug your page by inviting them to see what others are saying on Yelp.

RESPOND TO NEGATIVE REVIEWS

According to a study done by the Wall Street Journal in 2020, 58% of customers who complained received no response from the business. Don't be a business that doesn't respond! Take time each week to carefully and tactfully respond to reviews in an apologetic and empathetic way.

TIPS FOR SUCCESS ON INSTAGRAM

Create both an Instagram and Facebook company account to help your company reach a bigger audience and its fill potential.

BE CONSISTENT

Instagram is a highly visual platform. Across all your posts, aim to use the same filters and establish a similar aesthetic, both in terms of graphics, fonts, colors, and overall photographic style.



POST TO STORIES

Stories are a great way to interact with your users. They are temporary posts staying up for 24 hours and allow for audience engagement (polls, questions, etc.)

PROMOTE (within reason)

When using promotional posts make sure to follow the 80/20 rule; only post 20% self-promotion to not drive away customers.

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ENGAGE YOUR AUDIENCE

Craft content that encourages response, respond to your commenters, and like posts from the people you are following. Engaging with others will lead them to engage with you.

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CREATE REELS

Reels (short form videos) generate higher engagement rates and reach than typical IG posts. Get creative with your account by sharing these under-90 second clips.

STAY BRIEF & RELEVANT

Caption all your posts in a short yet engaging manner. In your captions, include relevant language and hashtags that will drive people to your page/posts.
